

#### Pin And Cut

Place pattern on the straight grain of folded fabric and cut out 2 layers at once slowly and accurately



#### **Mark Notches**

Wherever red V is marked on pattern, make a single snip at right angles to your raw edge must be MAXIMUM 0.5 cm (half a centimetre)deep - any deeper and you risk it fraying into your sewing line!




#### **Mark Dots**

Stick a pin through both layers in the centre of circles marked on pattern. Take out rest of pins and mark the wrong side of the fabric with these points with a dot using a pencil (or pen that disappears).

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n.b. – the darts on your pattern and sample may be on the curved corner instead of at the bottom, this is fine, use the same technique explained here, but follow the location given by the notches and dots on your pattern.





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#### **Pin Darts**

Fold darts, matching the notches and folding so that the fold meets the dart point dot you marked. You can draw lines for your first couple of darts in pencil/chalk for ease of sewing – then try the next 2 without marking. Do pin them all though.

#### **Sew Darts**

Sew the darts, starting at the wide end, with a size 2.5 to 3 stitch, backstitching at both ends – or leave the ends and tie a reef knot insteda. Make sure you sew all the way to the end each way. The dart point you've marked on pencil shows where to stop sewing.

SNIP threads off at your work if you don't want to trim it later.

#### **Press Darts**

When you've sewn all 4 darts, press the darts on one piece inwards and the darts on the other piece outwards. This is to reduce bulk when you sew them together.



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## Purse making instructions Page 3

#### Sew Top Edges To Create Gap For Zip

Place the 2 pieces of the purse together – right sides together, and stitch top edge with a 1.5cm SA (seam allowance), from notch on edge to dot/below notch on top edge. Back stitch beginning and end of each piece of stitching.

## Neaten the edges of the gap where you will pin in the zip:


To fold over the gap edges evenly: CHALK a line 3cm down from top edge and fold/press open the top seam along line you just sewed and to meet the chalk line where there is no sewing (same technique you used to fold edges of bag straps). This way the gap turning and the sewn edge will be 1.5cm.

#### Place Zip

Place zip behind the folded edges (with right side of zip and purse facing you) with head of zip showing. Pin the fold of the fabric a couple of millimetres away from the zip teeth all the way down the left side of the zip




**Pin the 2<sup>nd</sup> (overlap) side** Then bring the other side of the purse's folded edge to meet the first so the zip is covered up. Pin the second side 1cm ish away from the fold. It should look like this, ready to hand baste (tack)



Hand baste in your zip, stitching 3 stitches on the spot at start and end to secure (instead of a knot) – more or less over the pins. Keep your stitches and gaps no longer than 1cm, preferable slightly shorter, so it holds it in well when you remove the pins





Grab your masking tape and and grader ruler and tape a line of tape 1.1cm from the fold on the wider side that overlaps the zip (the 2<sup>nd</sup> side you pinned)

## NB: these pics show pins but you will have basting and masking tape and no masking tape (much better)!



#### Zip Sewing Tips!

- Tap your machine pedal when you sew instead of putting your foot down hard - it slows you down and gives you way more control, you can even sew a stitch at a time this way!
- While sewing the first side, keep your eye glued to the distance between the edge of the zip foot and the folded edge of fabric next to the zip (approx 1mm) – keep that distance the same all the way down that side.
- While sewing the second side (tape guide side) look at the needle, not the foot, and have it sew right next to the tape but not on it
- If the fabric seems to stretch as you sew and suddenly you have a 'hill' of fabric as you approach the next pin, pinch the zip/fabric in front and behind the bit you are sewing and tug against your own grip from each end – this will stretch both a little and help even them out while you sew, until you're back on track.

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#### Sew Zip

- Using a zipper foot clipped onto the right side of the bar so the foot is pressing down on the fabric, not on the zip
- IF you have a metal end on your zip Mark where the metal ending if your zip is with a pin so you can sew just past it before sewing across at 90 degrees (next instruction).
- Open zip
- Start 0.5cm (see sample purse!) above the zip head,
- Look at stitch width on sample purse - stitch the zip with a top stitch 2 mm from the fold, right over the basting stitches – stop half way with needle down, lift presser foot, close zip, put presser foot back down, continue to end.

#### Finishing 1st Side Of Zip

When you get to the end, (end about 0.5cm after the zip gap in the fabric ends if you've not already marked for the metal bit), with needle down deep in cloth, lift the presser foot, pivot the fabric 90 degrees, and sew across the bottom end to reach the masking tape, to create one end of a rectangle

n.b. When you get to the end of the 2<sup>nd</sup> side of zip, stop with the needle in, close the zip, lift the presser foot, turn the fabric and sew across the top to meet your start point. Backstitch to secure.

## NB: these pics show pins but you will have basting and masking tape and no pins (much better)!





#### Sew 2<sup>nd</sup> Side Of Zip

The stitch on the overlap side will be 1cm from the fold, right up the edge of the masking tape (look at sample purse)

The zip will be closed from doing the first side.

Sew the second side, slowly so that you stitch right next to the masking tape all the way up. Stop half way, this time to open the zip and then continue sewing (stop with the needle in, lift the presser foot, undo the zip, place the presser foot back down and carry on sewing the line).


When you reach the beginning, pivot with needle in as before and sew across to where you started. At the top of the first side. Backstitch

Take purse off the machine and trim all threads short





Remove masking tape and unpick the basting Zip should look like this!

Now fold the purse so the right sides are together on the inside (purse is inside out) so you can sew round the edge before turning through. Do a 1 cm seam allowance. Backstitch both ends as usual.

To stitch nice smooth curves on the corners, sew as far as you can, turning the fabric as you go, keeping to 1cm SA...and when it becomes too difficult to keep to 1cm SA, stop with the needle in. Lift the presser foot and turn the fabric slightly, put the presser foot back down and continue sewing your curve. You can keep doing this until you have completed the curve.





#### Trim the seam allowance

round the curve down to 5mm (so the edges sit smoothly once purse turned through to right side).

#### Zig zag

on thin fabric use a 3-step zig zag or an ordinary zig zag with a zig-zag foot
On thickish fabric you can use an ordinary zig zag

Now edge-zigzag the edges together (use a medium width so it doesn't zag over your sewing line!) to stop the fabric fraying

**Press your seam allowance** to one side as much as possible using the sleeve board and iron.



**Then turn purse through** to right side, folding in top corners before turning purse right way out.

**Push corners through** with point of closed scissors if necessary once purse is right way out.

Why not decorate your purse with a bow or rose? Sew a few stitches by hand to secure the thread, then stitch the bow in place (if you're clever you can hide the stitched behind the middle wrap of the bow), sewing a few more stitches behind it when you have finished to stop the thread unravelling.



Your finished purse! Well done, what are you going to put in it?
