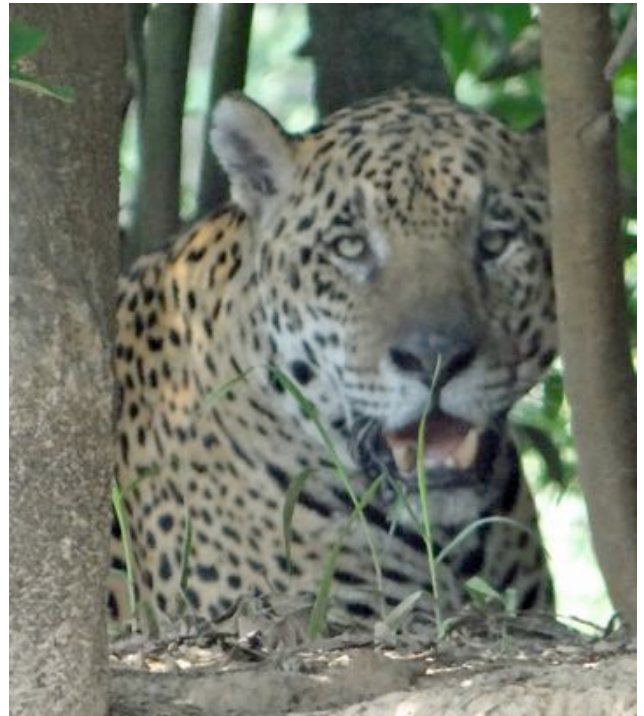
SUMMARY:

Once again we set off into the magical Brazilian Pantanal an area very familiar to Zoothera. This trip was a great success with many outstanding and very memorable experiences.

Amongst our bird sightings we were privileged to witness a magnificent Crested Eagle, lots of fantastic views of Hyacinth Macaw and, of course, 2 fantastic Jaguars, one of the most sought after mammals of the Neotropics.

Brazilian Tapirs showed well this year with 5 individuals seen, plus Giant River Otters that walked from 200 metres away to within 20 metres before it noticed us was a real highlight, as were the family of Giant River Otters. In fact an amazing 22 species of mammal were seen, as well as some super reptiles, butterflies and dragonflies. Superb boat trips produced the hoped for Sungebes and Sunbitterns, while our parrot tally included 19 species with 7 species of Macaw. We had amazing views of Pheasant Cuckoo, plus Band-tailed, Fiery-capped and Helmeted Manakins, the rarely seen Subtropical Doradito, Common and Great Potoos - the list just goes on. With a perfectly designed itinerary visiting the best of the regions lodges this never fails to be a pure delight to all those that travel with us. Its easy to see why this is one of our more popular tours.

Cuiaba - Pantanal Matto Grosso - 5th Oct

With everybody arriving safely the day before, our first day started with us leaving Cuiaba after breakfast and then heading towards the famous wetlands of the vast Pantanal. There were to be numerous roadside stops along the way but our first target species was spotted near Pocone when a **Red-legged Seriema** was spotted by our driver. It didn't stay on view long but we were confident we had more chances to see this strange bird again. Our next stop beside a restaurant produced a **Guira Cuckoo** eating a frog, **Brown-chested Martin** on wires, **Great Kiskadee**, and a little further on were juvenile **Rufescent Tiger-heron**, **Wattled Jacanas** and some distant **Savanna Hawks**. We then found our first **Greater Rheas** but even better was the **Rheas** we saw accompanied by a band of chicks. Next up was a **Crane Hawk** that flew across and was eventually seen perched in a dead tree before flying off again, while a **Campo Flicker** put on a nice show. The next pond we came too produced better looks at **Savanna**



Hawks, our first **Lesser-yellow-headed Vulture**, **White Woodpeckers** flying off and then some great looks at our first **Whistling Herons**. We then arrived at Pousada Puvial and took a short walk into the scrubby forest. We soon found a pair of **Masked Gnatcatcher**, **Olivaceous Woodcreeper**, **Black-fronted Nunbirds** and brief views of both **Rufous-tailed Jacamar** and **Chestnut-eared Aracari**. Moving on a little we found a group of **Black-tailed Marmosets**, followed by a tree of nesting **Crested Oropendolas**, with some showy **Thrush-like Wrens**, and great views of a pair of



Golden-collared Macaws and eventually good views of **Planalto Antshrike** and **Flavescent Warbler**. It was now hot so we went to the lodge for lunch. A look around the tree in the grounds found us **White-eyed Parakeets**, **Rufous-bellied Thrush**, **Cattle Tyrants**, **Saffron Finches**, and out on the grasslands were **Capybaras**, **Amazon Kingfisher**, **Snail Kite**, **Jabirus**, **Limpkin** and **Wood Storks**. We had lunch and then looked around the gardens again soon adding **Golden-chevroned Parakeets**, **Monk Parakeets**, more **Thrush-like Wrens**, **Purplish Jay**, **Chopi Blackbird** and tame **Rufous Horneros**. We then left and continued our journey along the Transpantaneira. A stop for a very close **Red-legged Seriema** was appreciated, followed by ponds full of birds including **Plumbeous** and **Bare-faced Ibis**, **Jabirus**, more **Rufescent Tiger-herons**, a beautiful **Capped Heron**, **Cocoi Herons**, **Striated**

Heron, and literally hundreds of **Yacare Caimen**.

While looking at these we added **White-headed Marsh Tyrant**, **Unicolored Blackbirds**, **Roseate Spoonbill**, close **Savanna Hawks**, **Limpkins** galore, as well as **Black-capped Donacobius**, **Scarlet-headed Blackbird**. We then tried to continue the last 20km to our lodge but of course we got distracted with stops for **Red-footed Tortoises**, **Chaco Chachalaca**, **Chestnut-bellied Guans**, several **Sunbitterns**, **Capybara**, some **South American Coatis**, and finally **Blue-throated Piping Guan**.

Pantanal Matto Grosso - Porto Jofre - 6th Oct

This morning we had early coffee and biscuits before setting off on our boat ride on the Pixiam River. As we slowly cruised along we saw **Aningas**, **Neotropic Cormorants** and great views of several **Ringed** and **Amazon Kingfishers**. A **Pale-legged Hornero** showed and we saw plenty of



Blue-throated Piping Guans. Two or three **Sunbitterns** gave a stunning performance especially when two of them flew over our heads and landed on the shore showing all their fantastic wing patterns. A little further on we spotted a skulky **Sungrebe** which eventually swam across a gap where most people got a reasonable view. A pair of **Chestnut-bellied Guans** walked along the river bank and both **Blue-fronted Parrots** and **Yellow-chevrons Parakeets** flew over. **Toco Toucans** flew across the river. There were plenty of **Cocoi Herons**, **Rufescent Tiger Herons**, **Little Blue Heron** and **Striated Herons** to be seen and then we watched both **Piratic** and **Rusty-margined Flycatchers**. As we watched a nice **Pale-crested**

Woodpecker and a **Little Woodpecker** we got great looks at a male **Helmeted Manakin**. Then we found a **Rufous-tailed Jacamar**, **Solitary Caciques** and a showy pair of **Rusty-backed Spinetails** and a posy **Great Antshrike**.

A couple of **Lesser Kiskadees** showed well beside a **Greater Ani**, plus a pair of **Masked Gnatcatchers**, **Black-crowned Tityra** then **Solitary Sandpipers**. Back near the bridge we watched **Grey-breasted Martins** and **Brown-chested Martins** as well as some small bats roosting under the bridge. After breakfast we took a walk into the riverside forest and soon found **Vermilion Flycatcher**, **Scaled Doves**, **Buff-necked Ibis**, and in the scrub we watched **Matto Grosso Antbird**. We then got good looks at a trio of birds including **Rusty-fronted Tody-Flycatcher**, **Fuscous Flycatcher** and **White-lore Spinetail**. A **White-winged Becard** showed as well as **Streaked Flycatcher**, and **Southern Beardless Tyrannulet**.

By the feeders we had lots of **Yellow-billed Cardinals**, **Bay-winged Cowbirds**, **Giant Cowbird**, **Saffron Finches** and even some tame looking **Southern Cararacas**.

After lunch we set off on the drive to Porto Jofre. Many stops were made along the way. A few **Marsh Deer** were seen and many of

the usual waterbirds we were now used to seeing. Our first **Southern Screamers** were found and later a pair with chicks which we decided should be called squealers! On one of the roadside ponds we had **Black-crowned Night Herons** and **Purple Gallinule**, then we stopped at Jaguar Lodge for a rest stop and some cold drinks. Here we were treated to great views of seven **Hyacinth Macaws**, in the same tree as a nest with two huge **Jabiru**. There was also **Black-tailed Tityra** and two



Narrow-billed Woodcreepers. Nearby were a pair of **Rusty-collared Seedeaters**, before we set off again soon seeing **Great Black Hawk**, **Green Ibis**, **Black-bellied Whistling Ducks**, lots of **Snail Kites**, **Black-capped Donacobius**, **White-headed Marsh Tyrant**, and tons of **Capybaras**. We also had a nice group of five **Large-billed Terns**. We then checked an area of special low scrub habitat and found our target birds which were **Cinereous-breasted Spinetail**, a **Subtropical Doradito** and a

Striped Cuckoo. The finishing touches were great views of an **American Pygmy Kingfisher.**

Porto Jofre - Boat Trip - 7th Oct

This morning before breakfast a couple of the group saw a **Barn Owl** and then we got great views of a pair of **Toco Toucans** outside our rooms. We then set off on our 6 hour morning boat trip in search of the magnificent **Jaguar**. We stopped along the way to get good looks at **Black Skimmers**, **Large-billed Terns** and the smaller **Yellow-billed Terns** on a small section of sandy shore, plus fabulous views of **Pied Lapwings**. Our next encounter was a group of 7 **Giant River Otters**. Continuing on we watched a stunning **Orange-backed Troupial**, followed by a **Blue-crowned Trogon**, and good numbers of **Great Black Hawks**. In a small creek we had a frenzied mixed flock which started with a pair of **Ashy-headed Greenlets**, soon joined by **Rufous-tailed Jacamar**, **Stripe-necked Tody-Flycatcher**, **Masked Gnatcatchers**, a **White-wedged Piculet**, **Hooded Tanager**, **Bananaquit**, **Common Tody-Flycatcher**, and even **Ringed Kingfisher** and a **Great Black Hawk** came in to have a look. Moving on we found the nest of a **Grey-crested Cachaote** before finally taking a small tributary where we



we were delighted to find two small boats watching a **Jaguar** resting on the river bank. We watched as this magnificent beast layed there looking around, then calling out loud, before eventually getting up and strolling off into the bush. All in all a good hour was spent in the company of South Americas top predator. We then set off and checked another small river where we saw a **Jabiru** nest with both adults and young, and then a funny thing happened as about 6 or 7 fish jumped out of the water straight into the boat! Several **Green Ibis** were seen, **Rufous-browed Peppershrike**, **Southern Rough-winged** and **White-winged Swallows**, **Bar-winged Water-Tyrant**, two tricky **Boat-billed**



Herons, **Green Iguana**, as well as lots of super dragonflies including **Red-tailed Blackwing** and **Flame-tailed Skimmers**. Finally a **Little Cuckoo** was spotted and we watched a **Buff-bellied Hermit** flitting around a flowering bush beside the river. We then headed back to the lodge for lunch and some welcome cold drinks. After lunch and a rest we met up in the afternoon ready for our second boat trip. Before that though we went to look at a **Brazilian Porcupine** high in a tree in the gardens. While here we also saw **Black-tailed Tityras**, a perched **Gilded Sapphire** and then a **Red-billed Scythebill** spotted by Chris. Also in the grounds during our rest were

photographic **Hyacinth Macaws** and **Toco Toucan**. Out on the boat our first new bird of the afternoon was a **Crimson-crested Woodpecker**, shortly followed by a group of **Brown Capuchins**. We then had a **Straight-billed Woodcreeper** on a dead tree and after a bit of pishing we attracted in **Hooded Tanagers**, **White-wedged Piculet**, **Common Tody-Flycatcher**, **Gilded Sapphire**, **Versicoloured Emerald**, and two **Black-throated Mangos**. **Barred Antshrike**, and **Lined Seedeater**, Further on we found two female **Bare-faced Currasows**. The first of many **Band-tailed Nighthawks** appeared flying over the river, we saw another male **Bare-faced Currasow**, **Capped Heron**, and to round the day off nicely we had another **Jaguar** come out of the reeds and onto a

sandy shore. Fantastic!! As we headed back we saw lots of **Lesser** and **Greater Fishing Bats**.

Porto Jofre - Rio Claro - 8th Oct

This morning we had an early breakfast and then a walk around the grounds of the lodge. **Hyacinth Macaws** showed off in the palms and **Toco Toucans** outside our rooms. Down by the boardwalk which crossed two ponds covered with Giant Lily pads we saw a pair of **Crimson-crested Woodpeckers**, **Southern Screamers**, **Green Ibis** and **Green Kingfisher**. In the forest we saw a **Fawn-breasted Wren** and a pair of **Ferruginous Pygmy-Owls**. Then we found a really nice group of **Black-and-gold Howler Monkeys** including several mothers carrying babies. We returned to our rooms, packed and set off to our next destination. Driving along we saw many of the same birds as yesterday, but added a **White-tailed Hawk** circling around then we stopped at an area of forest we know as the “owl spot”. Here we watched two **Great Horned Owls**, **Greater Thornbirds**, a **Pygmy Kingfisher**, **Grey-crested Cachalote**, **Great Antshrike**, a **South American Snipe**, **Bar-winged Water-Tyrant** and **Little Woodpecker**. We continued on seeing some very smart **Scarlet-headed Blackbirds**. and **Long-tailed Ground-Doves**. After a lunch stop we continued on towards Rio Claro. Once we had settled in we took an evening walk which produced **Great Rufous Woodcreeper**, **Blue-crowned Trogon**, **Glittering-throated Emerald**, **Red-throated Piping Guan**, and **Jabirus** on a nest. A night drive for those that wanted it produced **Brown Brocket Deer**, **Crab-eating Fox**, **Crab-eating Racoons**, great looks at a close **Common Potoo**, and a **Great Potoo**.



Rio claro - Pousa Alegre - 9th Oct

This morning we set off at dawn for a boat trip on the quiet waters of the Rio Claro. We soon had the first of three **Green-and-rufous Kingfishers** fly past. Unfortunately all were so quick that not everyone got onto them. Our first of seven sightings of **Sungrebe** included a few that flew across the river but all went deep into cover. A close **Band-tailed Antbird** was seen by all, and lots of **Greater Anis** gave us our best looks so far. There were plenty of heron species, plus **Blue-throated Piping Guans**, and both **Ringed** and **Amazon Kingfishers**. Then we had a superb sighting as a **Brazilian Tapir** was spotted swimming across the river in front of us. Further on we found a pair of **Purple-throated Euphonias**, and yet another great sighting was a **Neotropic Otter** that was fishing and totally unconcerned by our presence. We then returned for breakfast after a very successful morning. After breakfast we drove to a near area of dry woodland and soon found a **Grey-crested Cachalote**, alongside a **Rufous Casiornis**. There was also **Large Eleania**, **Variable Oriole** and **Lined Seedeater**. We then found two **Dark-billed Cuckoos** which after a bit of perseverance everyone got to see. Next up was a **Red-pileated Finch**, shortly followed by **Rufous-fronted Thornbirds**. It was now super hot so we returned to the lodge for a rest and to cool down a little. **Nanday Parakeets** were busy feeding around the lodge gardens. After lunch we loaded our bus and set off on the short distance drive to our next lodge. Along the way we saw **Capped Herons**, **Gray-necked Wood Rails**, **Muscovy Duck**, **White-faced Whistling Ducks** and the regular assortment of waterbirds we see each day. From the entrance gate of Pousa Alegre we slowly drove the 6km track seeing **Chestnut-bellied Seed-**



Finch, lots of **Capybaras**, **Greater Rheas**, and then a fantastic male **Brazilian Tapir** keeping cool in a small roadside pond. At the lodge we had a rest before going out in the late afternoon. Huge **Tegu Lizards** were around and nearby some of the group saw **Red-crested Cardinal** and **Green-barred Woodpecker**. Our evening drive took us to an area where we saw another adult **Tapir** and some people saw a stripey juvenile. **Undulated Tinamous** could be heard, **Toco Toucans** were seen and then as it got dark we saw a couple of **Crab-eating Foxes**, a **Pauraque** perched on the ground, a **Great Potoo**, a **Tropical Screech-Owl**, and then another adult **Brazilian Tapir**. So that was 5 **Tapirs** in 1 day ! Wow!!!

Pousa Alegre - Currupira das Araras - 10th Oct

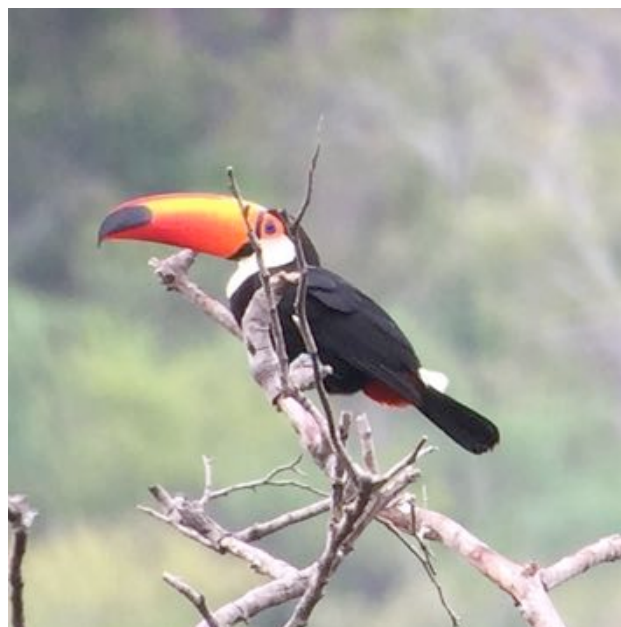
Today we had an early morning start to see if we could spotlight anything in the vast grounds of this lodge. A couple of **Crab-eating Foxes** and **Brown Brocket Deer** were seen. Out along the road we scoped both **Blue-crowned Parakeets** and **Orange-winged Parrot**. Several **Plumbeous Kites** flew over, and everyone eventually got to see **Azara's Agouti**. We then scoped **Scaly-headed Parrot** and got close views of **Pearly-vented Tody Tyrant**. Our next stop found nesting **White Woodpeckers**, several **White-rumped Monjitas**, photo opportunities for **Red-crested Cardinal**, **Chalk-browed Mockingbirds**, and flocks of **Fork-tailed Flycatchers**. On our way back we spotted **South American Coatis**, and had great looks at **Long-tailed Ground-Doves** and **Capped Herons**. After breakfast another **Red Crested Cardinal** was spotted, then **Squirrel Cuckoo** and on a walk along a boardwalk we got good views of **Scarlet-headed Blackbirds**, **White-bellied Seedeater**, **Guira Cuckoos**, **Black-collared Hawks**, and further on we had **Snail Kites**, **Pygmy Kingfisher**, **Green-barred Woodpecker**, **Matto Grosso Antbird** and **Great Antshrike** plus a number of good looking butterflies.



We then had a talk from the owner who showed us some of the snakes that can be found in the property. After lunch we left for our next destination arriving at Curripa das Araras at dusk

Currupira das Araras - 11th Oct

This morning we went out before breakfast. A walk into a patch of forest produced **Masked Tityras**, some perched **Dusky-headed Parakeets**, then we had a pair of **Lettered Aracaris**. Further into the forest we found a **Buff-throated Woodcreeper**, and some **Magpie Tanagers**, then we got onto a **Short-tailed Pygmy-Tyrant**, followed by a pair of tricky **Black-throated Antbirds**, and a **Blue Ground-Dove** that refused to perch for more than a second at a time. A couple of **Red-shouldered Macaws** perched in a tree and showed well, and we got good views of a pair of **Moustached Wrens** in a tangle. Another pair of **Black-throated Antbirds** put on a great show and back out by the bus we saw **Yellow-tufted Woodpecker**, **Scaled Pigeon**, and then 5 **Black-tailed Trogons**! A **Plumbeous Kite** sat on a dead tree top, more **Magpie Tanagers** were spotted, and then as we headed back for breakfast we stopped by the ponds and saw lots of **Least Grebes**, **Black-necked Stilt**, **Lesser Yellowlegs**, **Solitary Sandpiper**, **Brazilian Teals** and **White-faced Whistling Ducks**.



Beside the lodge were more **Plumbeous Kites**, **Peach-fronted Parakeets**, **Chalk-browed Mockingbirds**, **American Kestrel** and **Masked Tityras**. After breakfast we spotted more **Red-shouldered Macaws** around the gardens.

Back to the forest we had **Chestnut-eared Aracaris**, a **Brown Jacamar** and **Thick-billed Euphonia**s. A perched **Blue-headed Parrot** was nice and then we then drove the road seeing **Gray Monjita**, several **Burrowing Owls** and **Campo Flicker**. As we headed back we stopped and walked the last section back to the lodge. A **White-eared Puffbird** showed well, followed by a smart **White Woodpecker**, **Yellow-tufted Woodpeckers**, then a showy **Rusty-backed Antwren**, a distant pair of **Red-and-green Macaws** plus three **King Vultures** circling together and some great dragonflies.

After an afternoon relaxing we all took a look at a **Grey-fronted Dove** on its nest and then set off to check an area of dry scrub and woodland edge. We got out of the bus and watched a nice **Toco Toucan** as well as several perched **Blue-headed Parrots**. Then a pair of **Brown Jacamars** showed nicely, there were **Maggie Tanagers** and a flock of about 12 **Red-bellied Macaws** flew over. We scoped both **Plumbeous** and **Scaled Pigeons**, a **Short-tailed Hawk** was seen and the constant sound of **Undulated Tinamou** could be heard, but despite another attempt at seeing one the tinamou won!

A pair of **Orange-winged Parrots** were seen as well as **Silver-beaked Tanager** and **White-lined Tanagers**. We then drove back to the forest for dusk and shortly after it became dark we tried for **Tawny-bellied Screech-Owl** and was successful as a bird came right in close and showed briefly before flying off. A **Common Parauque** was also seen before we headed back to the lodge.



Currupira das Araras - Chapada de Guimaraes - 12th Oct

This morning we set off before breakfast on a short drive to an open grassy farmland area. Many **Burrowing Owls** were seen and then a stop beside the road had us out with scopes and Gina soon spotted an adult **Crested Eagle** sat in a tree. As we watched this superb bird we also saw **Blue-and-yellow Macaws**, **Red-and-green Macaws**, **Red-bellied Macaws** and **Orange-winged Parrots**, plus a distant **Aplomado Falcon** perched on a dead tree, followed by **Cliff Swallows** and **Campo Flicker**. Further on we spotted a **Red-winged Tinamou** walking through a grassy field. Continuing on we had **Yellow-bellied Eleania**, and beside a bridge, **Brown Jacamar**, **Masked Tityra**, **Forest Eleania** and we could hear but not see **Cuvier's Toucans**. Driving back for breakfast we found another **Red-winged Tinamou** which everyone got to see well. After breakfast we set off towards the Chapada, arriving in time for lunch at the National Park and a huge waterfall. Here a short walk to view the falls produced **Lesser Eleania**, **Cliff Flycatchers**, **Burnished Buff Tanagers**, close **Swallow Tanagers**, **Blue Dacnis** and under the water fall several nesting **Great Dusky Swifts**. We then had good views of **Biscutate Swifts** plus a superb pair of **Blue-winged Macaws** perched in a tree top. While we had a super lunch we also saw a **Pale-breasted Thrush**. We then drove to our fabulous lodge and settled into our rooms. Nearby a few people saw both **Brazilian Cavy** on the lawn and an **Upland Sandpiper**.

Chapada de Guimarães - 13th Oct

This morning we had an early breakfast and then set off to visit the nearby Cerrado habitat. We managed to park conveniently beside a group of young **Burrowing Owls** that begged to have their photos taken. We then spotted several **Shrike-like Tanagers**, **Grassland Sparrow**, a **Spot-backed**



Puffbird, a perched **White-vented Violetear**, **White-rumped Tanager** and a nice **Rufous-winged Antshrike**. Moving on we spotted **Curl-crested Jays**, **Lesser Eleania**, **Plain-crested Eleania**, and **Red Pileated Finch**. A **Collared Crescentchest** gave a fabulous performance, while a **Chapadas Flycatcher** was seen by a few. The sandy roads all around the cerrado were ideal for spotted animal tracks and we noted fresh marks of Puma, Fox, Tapir and species of small cat? We then headed for lunch. After which we drove to a shady forest track. Here we soon found a **Yellow-ridged Toucan**, **Lineated Woodpecker**, and superb views of several **Band-tailed Manakins**. A **Fiery-capped Manakin** put on a good show, as did a **White-backed Fire-eye**, although a **Amazonian Motmot** was a little brief.

Then we drove to an area near some caves. Her we witnessed about 150 **Mississippi Kites** flying around, plus a couple of **Red-legged Seriamas**, **Swallow-wing**, **Fork-tailed Palm Swift**, and unfortunately a flock of **Yellow-faced Parrots** were just too far away to go on our list. As the sun set we added both **Least Nighthawks** and **Little Nightjar**.

Chapada de Guimarães - 14th Oct

Our last morning saw us out early to check another area of dt Cerrado outside of town. We saw both **Great Dusky** and **White-collared Swifts** along the way and several close **Swallow-tailed Kites**. As we began walking a dusty track we found **Black-faced Tanagers**, a **White-eared Puffbird** and then a pair of **Slaty Antshrikes** a **Lesser Eleania** on its nest and a **Barred Antshrike**. Les then spotted a **Brazilian Porcupine** in a tree, we had a **Amazonian Motmot** nearby and a **Rufous-tailed Jacamar**. As it was getting hot we drove to an area of shady forest. Here we saw **White-bellied Warbler**, **Flavescent Warbler** and a superb sighting of **Pheasant Cuckoo** sat out in the open, a great end to a fantastic tour.

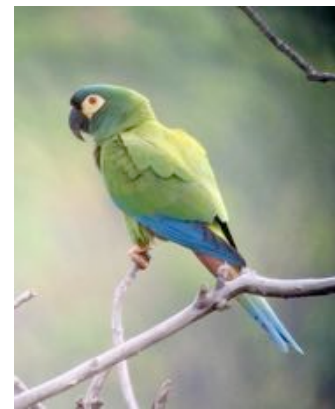
