Imaginings and what might have been

When a baby or very young child dies it is inevitable that, at some point, you will wonder how they would have grown up and what impact their lives would have had on yours.

I have three brothers but two of them died as infants. Colin born in 1941 lived for only seven months, Charles, born in 1945, lived for only five days. Colin was born two years before me and Charles two years after me. Both boys died as a result of being born with rhesus hoemolythic disease. I was born with it too but somehow survived. Until twelve months ago I didn't even know where Colin was buried but thanks to Paula of Brief Lives – Remembered I do now. I did not grieve for these two boys until my mother died two years ago. How she survived those infant deaths I cannot begin to imagine.

Now, with the grief come the what ifs? If these brothers had survived how would they have related with me and the rest of the family? Would I have found one easier to get on with than the other? Would we have fought or quarrelled as some siblings do? Would either or both have inherited the artistic gene coming through my father's line or would they have been practical and eager to work on the 360 acre family farm? Would they have been able to overcome my father's difficult and stubborn nature and worked with him? Would they have inherited the more placid, tolerant nature of my mother's line and been able to with 'a soft answer turn away wrath' or would they, like my brother in Canada, have had to forge a life as far away from my father's influence as they could?

Would they have had strong shoulders to cry on when life seemed cruel? Would we have made a strong threesome, much younger than the rest of our siblings, sticking together and backing each other up when our older sisters tried to be the boss? Would they have been fair skinned as I am or have inherited a darker complexion from the Knight line? Would I have married a farmer, one of their friends made in the Young Farmers' Club? Would one have been super intelligent and the other a determined plodder? Would they have gone to university and chosen careers in academia rather than in agriculture.

None of these questions will ever have an answer unless you believe, as I do, that in an afterlife, we will have all eternity to discover life's mysteries and in that eternity I will meet those two brothers, comfortable in their spiritual bodies as God intended them and assisting and nurturing me in mine



Ask Me His Name - By Elle Wright

Elle Wright had an admittedly easy pregnancy - her scans went well, she and her baby were healthy throughout, and in May 2016, she and her husband welcomed their son, Teddy, into the world. Just a few hours after giving birth, they woke to find a nurse holding a cold and unresponsive Teddy, who had stopped breathing during the night. The happiest day of Elle's life had turned into every parent's worst nightmare, and she had to let her beautiful baby boy go. Three

days after delivering him into the world, Elle sat with Teddy in her arms as he took his last breaths, and tucked him in for the final time. 'Ask Me His Name' is a moving account of Elle's pregnancy, Teddy's life, and what happens when a mother leaves a hospital with empty arms.

A very moving account of Stillbirth & coming to terms with the loss of her son.

<u> Peace - 60 Years On</u>

Back in October 2017 an article appeared in the mail online about a women whose stillborn baby had been traced. It was a story that struck my heart, I had grown up with the story of my parent's first born child being stillborn. The saddest part for me was that mum did not know what happened to her baby, I'd heard stories that perhaps he had been buried with an adult or perhaps just disposed of.

Mum carried her baby full term and went in to labour not knowing her baby was already dead. When she asked to see him she was cruelly told not to be so stupid she must know he was dead. It still brings tears to my eyes to think of how appalling this was and how on earth my parents managed to recover.

On reading the news story I thought perhaps my brother could be found.



I sent an enquiry to "Brief Lives – Remembered" and almost immediately received a reply from Paula. After confirming some details with my aunt who is the only person still alive other than my mum who was there at the time and completing the enquiry form. After just over a week from my first email, I received a message from Paula to call her as she had news. Ironically, I received this message and news on my dad's anniversary 23rd October.

Paula had traced my brother's resting place, she was able to provide a map and details of his burial in the Catholic section of the cemetery and that he was buried in his own casket alongside other babies.

I called my mum and broke the news to her, the effect on her was profound. My brother would have been 60 years old. My 83 year old mum kept telling me she was finally able to find some peace knowing where he was, a huge relief after 60 years of wondering. It is sad that my dad didn't live to see this, but I have to wonder at the timing of Paula's discovery.

Since this time, I have been back to the UK (I live in New Zealand) and with the help of the staff at Streatham Park Cemetery in London, mum has visited my brother's grave and I finally laid flowers for him. The cemetery staff have been so supportive and understanding in helping with the visit, they drove us through the cemetery as it is very large and mum cannot walk these days, they even went out and placed a peg in an otherwise clear expanse of grass to show the grave site. An entry has been made in their book of remembrance (copy seen above) and although a headstone is not possible as he is buried in a common grave, a memorial stone is currently being made and will be place with a rose bush in the Garden of Remembrance at the cemetery.

Although none of these things can make up for the terrible experience my parents had at the time, it was how things were done back then. We now know someone did care, my brother was buried appropriately but sadly he didn't have his parents there to mourn him that day, but has never been forgotten and has finally been found.

<u>Connected</u>

I was first born. My sister Angela was second born when I was two years old. I must have known her through our mother's tummy and would have had the usual encouragement to look forward to a baby brother or sister. Then nothing. I've always felt something or someone has been missing.

Two sisters, one brother and 65 years later Angela has been found.

Our father never mentioned her. Our mother mentioned her twice. Once to tell me the story of the birth which was followed by the tiny coffin passing by the foot of her bed in the front room of our two up two down terraced house in the UK. The second time she was mentioned was after the birth of my daughter also named Angela to say, 'You do know your sister was called Angela don't you?'

Our parents never got to look at her or hold her. They didn't know where she had been laid to rest. In those days it was considered 'best to forget and get on with life.'

Last year Paula found my sister's resting place using the birth/death year and address I recalled.



I visited the UK last year and shared the news with my siblings. One sister came with me to help me search for the grave. Baby Angela had been put to rest with 16 others in a public grave. There was no gravestone.

Now I have a memory of her. I know the date she was born. I can picture the beautiful willow trees she is at rest under and her gravestone is ordered. She will be remembered when I've gone. There will be a place marked to recognize she was here. She did exist even if it was in utereo.

Gaynor Christine Linnett

On the 11th April 1967 I gave birth to a lovely baby girl whom we called Gaynor Christine. I can remember her beautiful little face looking up at me in the brief time I was able to hold her. She unfortunately was born with Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalous and was taken to Westminster



Children's Hospital immediately for an operation, in those days Mothers were not taken with their babies. She seemed to be doing well but then blood poisoning set in and she died on the 6th May 1967. In those days stillborn and neo-natal babies were buried by the hospital and we had no part in it, so we never knew what had happened to her. Looking back now I

wonder why I let this happen, but it was as it was in those days. The next 50 years passed just living my life, I had another little daughter in 1968. Gaynor was never forgotten and always dearly loved. Then in 2017 I went to a Lent talk by a local Hospital Chaplain, and part of his talk was how babies were dealt with in those days. This was very emotional and made me think that I had to know where she is. I got in touch with Brief Lives Remembered and after months of hard searching the wonderful Paula

found her. This was not easy as she was born in Northampton and the hospital she died in is 60 miles away and no longer exists. She is in a communal grave with other babies at Streatham Park Cemetery. I have now taken flowers to her final resting place, it's so lovely to now have somewhere to visit. Once again I and my whole family thank Paula without whom this wouldn't have happened.

<u>John Wood - 18.9.92</u>

Our first son George was 2 years old when I became pregnant with John.

At my first scan which was at 19 weeks gestation back in 1992 we discovered our baby boy had multiple abnormalities due to an extra chromosome a condition named Trisomy 13. We were told he would never survive if I managed to carry him full term and therefore made the heartbreaking decision to terminate my

pregnancy which at 21 weeks meant giving birth naturally after being induced.

John was delivered on 18th September 1992 and he never took a breath.

The hospital Chaplin informed me that John would be cremated and we had a short emotional service for him



and were told that as he was tiny there would be no ashes to keep or scatter - heartbreaking.

The years passed and my third son Henry was born in 1994 a perfectly healthy baby.

In September 2018 near to what would have been John's 26th birthday I came across Brief Lives Remembered site through Derby Sands Organization website and found myself typing a message enquiring whether what we were told back in 1992 about John's ashes was true as over the years I have struggled with having no resting place we could visit.

The wonderful Paula contacted me within 24 hours to confirm our sons ashes were scattered in the crematorium garden and could even tell me the plot number.

How wonderful at last we had somewhere to go to say a proper goodbye and remember our second son.

I have since discovered that back in 1992 tiny babies like John were not cremated alone and that is why we were told there would be no ashes - cruel to say the least!

The other awful cruel twist to my story is that in November 2018 my husband of 31 years John's dad decided to leave me for another woman so having just found

some sort of peace with John's passing 26 years before - life has dealt me another devastating blow which 13 weeks down the line I am struggling daily to accept.



This was highlighted greatly last December when John's memory was acknowledged in the Derby Sands memorial garden in the crematorium grounds nearby to where Johns ashes were scattered and a name plaque was added to the beautiful butterfly memorial during a service that I attended with my youngest son Henry as my husband felt he could not attend.

I cannot thank Paula enough for her help sympathy and very kind words I am struggling along with being separated now after 34 years with my husband but take great comfort in knowing where my beautiful second son John is resting.
