The Annual General Meeting of the CPRA will take place on Wednesday 14th November 2012 at 7.00 pm. in the War Memorial Hall. This meeting is open to all residents of Cleeve Prior.

** It will be followed by an important Information Meeting on the progress of the village's Neighbourhood Development Plan Committee chaired by Nick Bury (see next page).*

*** The November Parish Council Meeting will follow promptly at 8 pm opening with a visit from Sgt. Phil Stayte of Evesham Police to inform residents on the crime scene locally.*

The main object of this CPRA AGM is to elect additional new members to the Committee to replace the four remaining founder members now standing down after eight years' service.

The CPRA, founded in September 2004, has represented the residents of Cleeve Prior on a range of issues over this period and has appreciated the active participation of many residents. Although a membership subscription has not been charged for last two years the Association is in good shape financially which should ensure its long term future with the new committee.

The presence of an active residents' association in Cleeve Prior has been a powerful support for the Parish Council and it is hoped that this can be maintained in the future.

Anyone who has the welfare and future of Cleeve Prior at heart and feels that they would like to put something back into the community but may not have the time to take up a position on the Parish Council (an overriding priority) is invited to put themselves forward for the CPRA Committee and, in accordance with the Association's Constitution, *may do so in writing to the Chairman prior to the meeting or, alternatively, orally at the meeting.*

The agenda for this meeting will be displayed on the village notice board from 31st October 2012. Should any person have a specific item not covered by the agenda that they wish to be raised will they inform the Chairman (Merlin Mather) of the subject matter before the meeting.

THE PROPOSED CLEEVE PRIOR NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

AN OPEN-INVITE TO A SHORT PRESENTATION ON THE PROCESS AND AN OPPORTUNITY TO SHARE YOUR VIEWS

**CLEEVE PRIOR MEMORIAL HALL
WEDNESDAY 14 NOVEMBER 7:30pm**

With a neighbourhood plan, communities will be able to establish general planning policies for the development and use of land in a neighbourhood. However, it can do much more; it can set a vision for the future. It can be detailed or general, depending on what local people want.

The steering group set up to produce the plan exists solely to represent the views of the local community. We are committed to ensuring that all residents have the opportunity to have their say on the draft neighbourhood plan and we are seeking the public's views on the plan's content, the impact of the plan and how any negative impacts can be avoided.

Once its scope has been finalised a draft plan will be published and made available for further comment before a final draft is presented to an independent examiner. If it meets the required standard the local council will organise a referendum to ensure the community has the final say on whether the plan will come into force. If more than 50% of those voting support the plan then the local planning authority must bring it into force.

Now is the time to put your thoughts and ideas forward. An open-invite meeting has been arranged to enable residents to come along and share their views. We will also set out the timeframe for consultation at each stage running up to finalisation of the plan, hopefully after a referendum in March 2014.

Ask yourself;

Should the plan set a single strategic objective?

Do you want the plan to influence where new development should be built and what it looks like?

How might young families be attracted to the village to protect the school's future?

How might we stimulate home working or other employment opportunities in the village?

How would you like to use existing public open space areas?

How would you like to protect, improve or utilise transport provision, footpaths, cycle routes, bridleways, sports fields and recreational facilities?
Should tourism play a part in the future of the village?
Is the existing signage in and around the village adequate?
Would a village computer in the tea rooms be a good idea?
If you have a view, share it!

It will be remembered that the South Worcestershire Development Plan (SWDP) proposed twelve dwellings be built south of the school on private property. After reviewing the Residents' Association survey conducted this summer, it was clear that parishioners were strongly against the proposal. Therefore, the Council resolved to object to the proposal.

The same Residents' Association survey revealed parishioner discontent concerning the Rooftop Proposal for six social housing units to the south of The Close. Consequently, should Rooftop apply for planning permission, the Council will engage professional expertise with the aim of convincing Wychavon District Council to refuse permission. The Council wishes to thank Mr Merlin Mather and other members of the Residents'

Association for their stellar efforts in producing, distributing and analysing the village survey.

Officers of WCC have indicated that solar powered flashing 20mph signs are to be installed near the school sometime during October/November. Hopefully the signs will be effective in calming traffic near the start and end of the school day. While on the subject of traffic calming, WCC is consulting with the Council on the proposal of increasing the speed limit along Evesham Road (from G Gower's house to the start of the 30mph zone) from 30 to 40mph. Co Cllr Bean informed the Council during the September meeting that he is in favour of the proposal. For those wishing to have their views on the subject be known, please contact the Clerk or a Councillor.

Finally, Sergeant Stayte intends to attend the November meeting and is happy to respond to questions or concerns of parishioners, However, he would like advance notice so he can provide more informed responses. Please forward concerns or questions to the Clerk by 9 November.

As you are all probably aware there has been a lot in the local press and on local television about pending funding cuts in small schools. This has been as a result of changes in the way the Government has allowed Local Authorities to set their budget.

I feel strongly that we have a “situation” not a “threat”. We must bear in mind that in two years’ time there will be another General Election and the current Government cannot afford to lose the “middle England” vote which will surely happen if small schools close.

Initially the Local Authority were allowed to put in a contingency plan to protect small schools for the next two years, however I have received a letter from Peter Luff confirming that this has now been extended to three years! Hopefully by that time the Government will have reviewed the funding for schools nationwide and will have resolved the enormous disparity between Worcestershire and the other 150 Local Authorities.

On a happier note we are now at the end of a very busy half term. The children have all taken part in Pedestrian Training – you may have seen them crossing backwards and forwards on the road in their fluorescent jackets.

Our Harvest Service was lovely and I am very grateful to Mr Wilderspin and all the children for their hard work both before and during. All the produce donated by parents was sent to The Vale of Evesham Christian Centre where it was gratefully received.

Many thanks to all those who supported our book fair – we raised £162 in commission.

The trip to the Birmingham Mailbox in October was hugely successful, as the following account shows. We all thank the organiser for her efforts.

'As visitors to the BBC's Broadcasting House at Birmingham's Mailbox we were introduced to the history of the corporation, (it started in 1922) and the function of the regional centre. On our tour we were shown the mechanics of a live (WMM) radio studio, the video editing of Countryfile, and the set-up for Midlands Today. We had sightings of Shefali (preparing her weather forecast), the show's director in the gallery with staff on the mixing desk and editors, all facing the wall full of TV monitors, plus the in-studio preparations of 'Mary and Nick' for that evening's live broadcast. We learned that the regional news programme lasts a maximum 27 minutes and 40 seconds leaving a flexible time for the weather to follow, depending on under or over-run, requiring the weather wo/man to improvise on live TV. Impressive!

The Archers cast were recording the next month's episodes in their studio throughout our visit, (they complete this in one week, monthly.) That denied us direct access. However, BBC Tours had set up an opportunity for our party to record our own version of a specially-written excerpt from the show, on a four-microphone set up. Our brave actor-volunteers, Susan, Meryl, Bridget, Flo and Mick, were accompanied with a range of sound effects provided by the multi-

talented Annette. They were all promised a personal copy of that BBC recording. Ask them if you'd like to hear it ... if you dare?

It was a stimulating visit, which closed with a group photo around a Dalek, that had mysteriously managed to make it up the stairs'.

A meeting of the WI was held on Wednesday 17 October. After our President's report and the usual business, we had a talk on an organization none of us had heard about previously. This is Severn Area Rescue Association, or SARA for short.

The talk was given by Dr John Dutton, ably assisted by Paul Fearnley, two of the volunteers in the Association which consists of 150 volunteers and several probationers. There are no paid members, and the volunteers come from all walks of life, Dr Dutton being a lecturer in Ecology and Conservation, and Paul Fearnley (now retired) worked in the NHS.

SARA is the largest rescue service after the RNLI and there are four Stations, at Chepstow, Sharpness, Tewksbury and Kidderminster. They all have their own equipment of boats, land vehicles etc. They work alongside the statutory emergency services, the Kidderminster station sharing the Gloucestershire Water Rescue Centre with the Retained Firemen, and are unique in this respect. The stations cover an area of land and water up as far as Shrewsbury and Hereford, and down as far as 10 metres out to sea.

With two Landrovers and two flood boats, they do land searches for missing children and vulnerable adults (they are members of the Mountain Rescue association). They cover boat operations, the fleets of boats can be operational in 20 minutes, and they help the seamen. They also do Swift water rescues which involves them getting into the water with no boats, in teams of 7 to 9, to rescue those in difficulties. They also take part in flood rescue. Land searches involve 14 operatives and 3 probationers. Training is compulsory and takes place every Thursday evening and Sunday morning for every discipline in which each is involved. Education is another huge aspect of their work.

Since there is no Government money, many hours of fund raising are involved, as each SARA station costs between £20.000 and £30.000 per year to run. The subject is far too large to cover here, but those who are interested can find details of this wonderful work on www.sara-rescue.org.uk.

Our next meeting will be held on 21 November and will feature a Jacob's Supper.

CLEEVE PRIOR RAMBLERS

We were a smaller group than last month and 13 ramblers and 4 dogs set off from Cleeve Prior on October 20th bound for Winchcombe where we left our cars and called at The White Hart Inn to order our lunch before beginning our walk.

We set off towards Sudely Castle entrance out of Winchcombe and branched off into the fields to the right, skirting round the castle ruins on our left and crossing over The Windrush Way and The Wardens Way before climbing up through the fields of Sudely Hill Farm. We stopped to admire the views and animals, unusual breeds of sheep, pigs with their piglets and a llama. The sausages which some of our group had ordered for their lunch were made with pork from this farm!

As we climbed the hill we passed St Kenelm's Well, a well-head building marking the sacred spot where St Kenelm's body was rested on the way to the Abbey. The well house was first built in 1549 and rebuilt and restored in 1887.

Through many muddy gateways and stiles we continued up the hill to The Salt Way. In the Middle Ages packhorses would deliver sacks of salt crystals along this route to the manors and monasteries of Gloucestershire from the Droitwich salt pits.

There were excellent views and we heard the steam railway as we descended back down the hill through very boggy fields to return to Winchcombe for a delicious lunch at our pub in the High Street. Some of us had very muddy dogs to put in our cars.

Thank you Mike and Bridgett for organising a lovely walk.
