1. BACKGROUND & CONTEXT

The Parish of North Huish is situated in South Devon between Dartmoor and the sea within an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It consists of the villages of North Huish and Avonwick as well as the hamlets of California Cross, Gara Bridge, Lupridge, Charford and Horsebrook.

In 2015 there are approximately 245 households and over 470 residents in the parish of North Huish.

Avonwick is the largest village in the Parish, and has grown in size over the last few years with two new housing developments. The village contains one of only a few proprietary chapels remaining in the country, a restaurant, pub, one of the oldest lawn tennis clubs in the world, a garage, children's play park and a small shop.

Land for a new community hall was provided by the developer of the latest block of new housing as part of their planning consent. Subsequently a community initiative has sprung up to take the project forward. It is against this backdrop and context that a

small group started this project to establish a new hall in order to fully cater for the growing local community's needs and aspirations both in the short and long term future.

Representatives from the committee attended a training event led by Devon Communities Together. This helped the committee to assess the size of the challenge posed by the current funding environment and prompted them to enlist the assistance of Devon Communities Together to provide an objective and professional approach to the task ahead.

Assisted and led by Devon Communities Together a plan was developed to engage and consult more fully with the community in order to further establish a shared community vision and the necessary evidence of need in preparation for applications for funding to the Big Lottery's 'Reaching Communities Buildings' programme.

This work has now been completed and is presented in this report.

2. AIMS OF THE CONSULTATION

- 1. To ensure that the project will meet the genuine needs and aspirations of the local community. This in turn will help to ensure the design/specification and business plan for the proposed hall is reflective of the community's wishes.
- 2. To engage with the wider community to build support for the project. This would include soliciting offers of in-kind voluntary support for making the project happen and to help shape and provide provision in the proposed hall.
- 3. To gather evidence in support of and hence to improve the chances of success when submitting a funding application to the Big Lottery's Reaching Communities Buildings programme.

3. METHODOLOGY & TIME-FRAME

The Survey was carried out by means of a questionnaire hand delivered by volunteers to practically every household within the parish of North Huish. The questionnaire was then collected, where possible, by the same volunteers about 2 weeks later. Devon Communities Together also set up an online facility for completing the questionnaire.

To ensure the coverage of as many households as possible a list of addresses within the parish were obtained from the District Council.

Devon Communities Together provided significant advice for this process and prepared drafts of the questionnaire for approval by the Project Steering Committee before printing and delivering the questionnaires to the committee for distribution and collection. Completed forms were taken by Devon Communities Together for analysis and the writing of this report.

The collection of forms by hand was used to maximise the response rate, as return levels are typically low (below 45% response rate) in most surveys of this nature. The higher the response rate the more representative the sample becomes. Any rate approaching or exceeding 50% would be considered statistically significant and a reliable indication of the views of the whole population.


The 294 people who responded to the Survey (including 14 who used the online facility) represent approximately 62% of the current population, an exceptionally high and very valid representative sample.

Below is a timeline of activities and events associated with the Project.

Date	Activity	Result
June 2014	A community consultation event was organised in the local pub garden with speakers from Devon Communities Together and the nearby hall in Rattery followed by discussions and feedback.	Around 50 local residents attended, discussed the Parish hall, reviewed the initial plans and provided the committee with useful direction to develop the project. See Appendix 1 for the outcomes of the consultation event.
Sep 2014	A Community Apple Pie Fair was held on the proposed hall site to engage the community and promote the project. The event was organised and led by the committee to better engage with this audience and identify their views.	450 people including 100 children attended this special celebration and consultation event See Appendix 2 for the feedback from the Community Apple Pie Fair.
Jan 2015	A household questionnaire survey was designed to allow up to 5 people per household to firstly identify which age range they belong to, and secondly to express their personal views.	See Appendix 3 for a copy of the final household questionnaire.
Feb 2015	230 survey forms were distributed throughout the Parish and to be either collected in person or delivered back to the community shop. A web based form was also available.	294 people completed the survey. This provided the committee with both a statistical and anecdotal evidence base that delivers a very valid representative sample of the total population of the Parish.
April 2015	Feedback the results of the consultation analysis to a community meeting, and results to be published on the Community Website	This will help to continue the community involvement and dialogue in the developing project.
Next Steps	The findings from the consultation work will be used to develop the business plan, design features and strengthen the funding bids.	Better informed bid development with stronger chances of success.

4. QUESTIONS, RESULTS & ANALYSIS

Question 1. What age group do each of you belong to? Summary Results:



284 answered10 skipped


These results are consistent with the known demographic profile of the Parish* and confirm that the results are a reasonable representative sample of the population. Note the even spread of age ranges, and in particular the largest proportion from the 40-64 age range probably reflecting the families residing in the newer properties in Avonwick.

Question 2. Do you support the project for a new community hall?

280 answered14 skipped

The 294 people who responded to the Survey (including 14 who used the online facility) represent approximately 62% of the current population, an exceptionally high and very valid representative sample.


There was overwhelming support for a new community hall with 84% of respondents reacting positively to the initiative. This is a clear endorsement by the community and now gives the project group a clear mandate to move forward with their plans.

The analysis also shows that there is a small percentage of the community not yet convinced of the proposal, and their interests and concerns need to be considered as the project develops.

178 respondents expressed an interest in joining or helping to form a range of activities. The most popular of which was library provision, followed by local craft and produce fairs, possibly influenced by the very successful Apple Pie Fair in September. Demand for educational and arts and crafts courses was also high.


It would appear that there is also significant interest in a range of other activities, and alternative proposals, that would contribute to having an active and well used hall.

Those that indicated a willingness to establish new clubs will be central to these ambitions becoming a reality. This will involve the Project group following up on these offers with support and guidance.


212 answered82 skipped

It would seem that the residents of North Huish Parish are keen to hold a range of social activities in the proposed hall. Lead amongst them is Drama which will potentially have implications for the design and facilities in the hall. The high interest in cafes, lunch and breakfast clubs would also indicate a need for suitable catering and kitchen facilities.



There is a slighty lower interest in Sports and dance activities, however by far the most popular was keep fit classes closely followed by dance. Badminton had significant interest which may potentially be a consideration for the dimensions of the hall.



There was strong feedback on the importance of an adequate and appropriate car park to both sustain the hall and minimise any disruption to the village. The project group will need to consider this aspect seriously given the current land available. The outdoor event space was also popular again building on the success of the Apple Pie Fair.



Question 7. Please indicate if members of your household would want the following INTERIOR facilities



The interest in the key indoor requirement reflect the earlier questions related to the activities potentially taking place in the hall, and include the key features found in many halls.

89 answered205 skipped

89 people responded to the call to arms to help in the development of the hall project, some offering a range of skills and experience. This community engagement and support bodes well for the project, and the more that are actively engaged the greater the likelihood of the project securing funding and establishing a sustainable hall.

The project team need to actively nurture and engage with these volunteers as the project evolves.





5. CONCLUSIONS

Have the aims of the consultation process been achieved?

Aim 1 - To ensure that the project will meet the genuine needs and aspirations of the local community. This in turn will help to ensure the design/specification and business plan for the proposed hall is reflective of the community's wishes.

An up to date and representative sample of the whole community's needs and aspirations has been recorded - with 294 people from across all age ranges, participating in the consultation survey process.

This has provided vital insights into the different needs and wishes of the community. These features are described in detail earlier in the report.

The overwhelming support for a new community hall gives a clear endorsement by the community and provides the project group a clear mandate to move forward with the task of planning a new Community Hall.

Aim 2 - To engage with the wider community to build support for the project. This would include soliciting offers of in-kind voluntary support for making the project happen and to help shape and provide provision in the proposed Community Hall.

89 people in the community have offered to give their practical skills and experience to help drive this project forward. Furthermore the two community open events that previously took place last year have helped the project team to engage directly with a broad cross section of the community.

A large contact list of supporters has been built up through this process which has empowered the project group to have strong ongoing community dialogue.

In summary there is a great body of local support and belief in this project. The project group is in a strong position to tap into this and move forward towards success!

Aim 3 - To gather evidence in support of, and hence to improve the chances of success when submitting, a funding application to the Big Lottery's Reaching Communities Buildings programme.

The result of this consultation has provided clear evidence for the need and interest in a new community hall in the community of North Huish Parish. When asked the question 'Do you support the project for a new community hall? , 84% of the people who answered, said "yes".

The survey has also indicated many ways in which this new facility could make a positive and significant difference to the lives of the local people. The results of this consultation show that the potential impact and outcomes of the proposed hall development reflect the programme aims of the Big Lottery Reaching Communities Buildings fund. These are:

- People having better chances in life, with better access to training and development to improve their life skills
- Stronger communities with more active citizens working together to tackle their problems
- Improved rural and urban environments, which communities are better able to access and enjoy
- Healthier and more active people and communities.
