The one on the left is produced by the top clayer Bettina Welker: that is how it should be done! So here are some links to give you inspiration, ideas and help. Here is one made a long time ago by Cara Jane – showing you how to put them together. Or you can buy a tutorial from Iris Mishly. Here is an example by Alkhymeia or a nice clear tutorial by Tina Holden here. As you can see she shows how you can potentially create a logo too.

Slightly off at a tangent, you could create your own stamp using mould maker – see <u>this idea</u>: More ideas <u>here</u>. Or if you don't want to make your stamp, you could have one made to your design – see <u>this</u>. Whichever way you go, they are a nice way to finish off your work.

Helen Breil is particulary discriminating in what she uses with her clay. She has recently recommended both Gorilla Glue Gel (the Gel doesn't slip) available here and as promised we now have some water based varnish which she considers is the best she has used, yet by Golden. You can get Gloss here or Matte â€" which she recommends as it is a protector without adding surface effects that you might not want. You can find that <u>here</u> It has been pointed out to me too that it is very economical as it is 4 fluid onces and can be watered down. A really good buy. We have a new supply of Pan Pastels
