Rev Ruth writes ...

Are we there yet?

There's nothing I dislike more than reading or listening to someone waffling on and basically saying nothing. Life's too short to even read 500 words with no content. And yet as I have been reflecting on what I would write for this bi-monthly article, every idea I came up with seemed trite or meaningless.



I do feel though that we need to address the proverbial elephant in the room and acknowledge that the past I5 months have been incredibly challenging for us all in different ways. I don't think that any of us had any idea just how long this pandemic would last or how much our lives would be turned upside down by it. Today, as I sit at my desk, it's May I7th and supposedly the country is just about to go into step 3 of the phased return to whatever the new normal will be.

I recognise that as businesses reopen more fully and some of the social distancing rules are relaxed, that this will in turn cause many people anxiety about their

safety. Many of us have now been privileged to have received one if not both of the anti-Covid vaccinations, and yet we know that there are still millions of people 'out there' who have not yet or will never have their jab. Who would have thought even 6 months ago that we would look forward to having an injection? Many of us have become accustomed to taking a lateral flow test every 3 days then waiting for just half an hour to ensure that we're Covid-negative and safe to meet others. But then you worry about all the other people who haven't done this.

There is a sense of panic from many people I have spoken to who, in fact, prefer to stay behind closed doors for as long as possible. We know, though, that for many people the isolation they have felt this past year has been detrimental to their mental health and well-being. We have been warned that it will take a long time for people to relearn social skills and that has been obvious as people start to meet up face to face again instead of on their computer screens. Have you noticed just how grumpy and intolerant many people have become, or even you in yourself? 'How long will this all go on for?' is a question that keeps cropping up.

The good news is that it's not all doom and gloom. We have access to doctors and nurses, and free medical facilities, even if somewhat restricted from what they used to be. We can, for the most part, still get our food shopping done relatively easily and with a huge variety of goods available. And most importantly, God is still on His throne. Romans 12v13 says "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, and faithful in prayer." And Romans 15v13 "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him." These two verses show us where to place our hope, and who to turn to when we are feeling afflicted; the answer will always be to Jesus. As we head towards Pentecost Sunday, we also say 'Come, Holy Spirit.'



Mission Action Planning is a central element in the diocesan initiative *Living God's Love*. It is a prayerful process of looking, listening and reflection leading into planning and prioritising; seeking, with the Spirit's guidance, to discern both a vision and also a course of action. Over the past few months a Working Group has met (remotely) on a regular basis to review our existing vision and to start putting ideas together as to ways we in which we could live it out working with, for and in our local community in ways that bring the joy of God's love into people's lives. The ideas are still at a very early stage of development but include

- Running a Café in St Michael's Room on a regular basis open to all but particularly for those who would appreciate the chance to meet others and talk.
- Restarting the Parents and Tots Group in St Michael's Room
- Looking at ways to bring back the Family Service
- Exploring the exciting ideas that came from the Outdoor Church presentation and the success of using the outdoor space to tell our stories.

We agreed that our next step is to discuss our ideas with the people we hope to attract to see what works best for them. We also need to bring together groups of people to help develop, oraganise and run these various activities. So can you prayerfully consider where you feel you could best contribute and let Rev Ruth or Rev Penny know.

St Mary's Church has signed up to TerraCycle an innovative recycling company that has become a global leader in recycling typically hard-to-recycle waste. To date, over 202 million people are collecting and recycling in 21 countries and have collected billions of pieces of waste, was 44 million dollars for charities around the world. At present we are
