

Rev'd Penny writes

At this time of year our thoughts often turn to the harvest. We are so grateful for God's good and abundant provision to us and give thanks that we do not have to go hungry or thirsty. We are thankful too for our farmers and other food providers, who carefully manage the resources in their care, in order that the harvest might be so bountiful.



Jesus told a story about a wealthy man whose land produced such an abundance of crops that he ran out of room to store his surplus produce. So, he decided to build for himself a bigger warehouse, and then he could eat and drink and party, free from any worries about his future (or anyone else's future for that matter). God wept for the lack of compassion shown by this man to his family and his neighbours. That night, the wealthy man died, and all his hoarded, stored-up goods were left behind, now to be enjoyed by someone else. God called him a fool.

Jesus told us not to worry about our life – what we eat and drink and wear, which is sound advice for a stress-free life, especially for those who have ample resources to fall back on. But recently, on account of Covid, some people have found themselves in different, unpredicted situations, maybe on a reduced income with very little money to support themselves or their dependants, or maybe worse, with no paid employment. It somehow doesn't feel right to tell people in these straightened circumstances just to simply trust God and all will be well.

But then again, maybe we should believe and say this. We, you and I, are God's ears, eyes, hands and feet here in this world. If we are willing, we have the means to be a part of God's answer to provide for those in need, the hungry and thirsty. Rather than storing up more goods, wealth, belongings, pasta, toilet rolls and so on in our barns, we are encouraged by God to show our heart of generosity to those who find themselves in less fortunate positions than ourselves.

Sometimes we really want to help God care for others but don't know where to start. Harvest Festival celebrations offer us an opportunity to be those helping hands. At St Mary's we are collecting toiletries, tins of meat, fruit and custard for the Hatfield Foodbank (not pasta please!) Donations can be brought to church on any Sunday in October and will be delivered to the Foodbank. And for those not planning to come to church, we might consider making a definite decision to put an item in the Foodbank Collection basket at the local supermarket, or even visiting the Foodbank to deliver donations in person?

God has provided all our wants to be supplied, the harvest is safely gathered, there is food to eat in our homes and we are thankful. May we strive to be wise in our stewardship of all that we have been entrusted with, and generous with our giving to others in response to God's many blessings to us.
